Answer each question completely. Answer these questions in complete sentences on a separate sheet of paper.

- 1. What remark does Caesar make to the soothsayer? The soothsayer's reply? What tone of voice would each use?
- 2. What does Artemidorus attempt to do? Who prevents him from doing this? What reason does Caesar give for not reading his petition?
- 3. Quote a passage that shows Cassius' fear that the plot has been discovered.
- 4. Explain the conceit in lines 60-70. What appeal does Metellus make to Caesar? What is his real reason for making this appeal? What is Caesar's reply?
- 5. Why does Caesar say "Et tu, Brute!" What does it mean?
- 6. What do Cinna and Cassius say and do immediately after the assassination?
- 7. Why does Brutus remain calm after the assassination? Explain the meaning of his statement "Ambition's debt is paid."
- 8. Where does Antony go during or immediately after the assassination? Why?
- 9. Explain lines 98-100.
- 10. What symbolic act does Brutus initiate?
- 11. What is Antony's immediate reaction upon seeing the corpse of Caesar? (Beginning with this scene, be alert for changes in Antony's characterization; contrast this with how he is perceived in Acts I and II.)
- 12. What lines in Antony's eulogy reveal his loyalty to Caesar? How does he at the same time play to winning over the assassins—to get their trust?
- 13. Explain the conceit in lines 194-210.
- 14. Consider carefully Antony's soliloquy, lines 254-275. Explicate carefully. What does it show about Antony's real feelings and intentions? How has Act III.i proved Antony to be unlike the man he is portrayed as in Acts I and II?
- 15. Who is Octavius? What message does Antony give to Octavius? Could there be an ulterior motive on Antony's part?
